Oncology Pharmacist Scope¹

- Apply clinical skills and knowledge of therapeutic drug management in cancer patients
- Generate, interpret, and disseminate cancer-related information
- Develop, implement, and maintain oncology-related guidelines, policies and standards
- Provide public awareness and service as a public health advocate for the oncology population



Outcomes²

- Decrease ER visits, inpatient admissions
 - \$ Cost savings initiatives
- Medication utilization evaluation
- Patient outcomes



Oncology Pharmacist Value

Oncology Pharmacists are key in the involvement of the interdisciplinary healthcare team in lending their medication expertise, expanding upon value and quality based outcomes, and improving patient care.

- The board-certified oncology pharmacist is well suited to serve on the oncology care team, as a physician extender, and the medication expert.³
- Oncology pharmacists participate in a wide array of programs including oral chemotherapy programs, medication therapy management, and collaborative practice agreements.⁴
- Oncology pharmacists are involved in many clinical and administrative functions including multidisciplinary management. While a core set of clinical functions have been identified, oncology pharmacists must prepare for the increased use of oral oncology agents and immunotherapy, in value-based reimbursement and other data-based quality outcome measurements.¹
- Pharmacist involvement in oncology clinics has been associated with improved symptoms, satisfaction and wellbeing scores.⁵
- Outpatient oncology practices may benefit from integrating pharmacists into care models in order to more effectively, efficiently, and holistically address the needs of patients with cancer.⁶



Oncology Pharmacist Management Programs

Oncology Pharmacist-led therapy management programs can lead to increased medication adherence, decreased ER/hospital admissions, and decreased symptom burden.

- Pharmacist-led oral chemotherapy model developed, resulting in improved patient knowledge regarding oral chemotherapy, improved adherence rates and superior MMR outcomes for patients with CML compared with published literature.⁷ (University of North Carolina)
- Adverse events in a non-small cell lung cancer patient population can be successfully managed in a community-based setting with the addition of collaborative pharmacist-led patient education, adverse event monitoring/interventions, and continuous follow-up.⁸ (Florida Cancer Specialists & Research Institute)
- Pharmacist-led oral oncology management program attributed to decreased grade 3/4 toxicities, decreased ED/hospitalizations, and increased adherence.⁹ (Henry Ford Cancer Institute)
- Implementation of a pharmacist-driven outreach program for immune-related monitoring increases early recognition and treatment of immune checkpoint inhibitor toxicities, with the pharmacist uniquely positioned to identify toxicities early and prevent greater toxicity downstream.¹⁰ (University of Wisconsin)
- Pharmacist collaboration with oncologists at an outpatient clinic, resulted in a 57% adverse event improvement following the acceptance of pharmacist-recommended interventions.¹¹ (Japan)
- Oncology pharmacists can aid in the development of CINV patient care plans, in addition to assessing drug interactions, as they are well versed in drug management.¹²



Clinical Focus Areas

- Oral Anticancer Agents
- Immunotherapy
- Symptom Management
 - Nausea/vomiting, pain, depression, anxiety
- Supportive Care Utilization
 - Growth factors and antiemetics
- Pathway Compliance



POEM Engagement

Practice/Pharmacist

- MOQC participant
- Sign POEM agreement
- Commitment to embedding a pharmacist into direct ambulatory patient care
- Mutually agreed upon scope of work for the clinical pharmacist
- Collaborative practice agreement (CPA) support
- Bill for clinical service
- Collect and share data

POEM Coordinating Center

- Support practice site in recruitment efforts
- Provide resources and support to the pharmacist for clinical service
- Collect and analyze program data and provide practice-level reports
- Regular scheduled mentoring, training, and follow-up with the POEM pharmacists
- Pharmacist funding support: 100% year 1, 60% year 2, 20% year 3
- BCBSM provided VBR 10% on RVUs

Program Structure

- 4 days clinical/1 day administrative role
- Weekly pharmacist meetings (10 noon on Thurs) – logistics, best practice sharing, education, collaboration
- Educational programming to date:
 - Oral chemo program summary (Henry Ford)
 - N/V patient reported outcome summary (Michigan Medicine)
 - HOPA-ASCO Quality Training Program completion




Pilot Sites - Progress to Date

- Clinical Focus Oral Anticancer Agent (OAA) Therapy
- Schedule currently allows for 8 patient visits/day
- Billing in place
- Collaborative Practice Agreement pending final approval
 - Symptom management (diarrhea, constipation, nausea/vomiting, and depression/anxiety)
 - Cancer therapy induced hyperglycemia and hypertension management
 - Statin adjustments
- Anticipated impact approximately 280 new starts/year with 3 "touches"/patient
 - Pre-treatment
 - 1 week post start
 - 1 month post start (then PRN)
 - Minimum = 850 billable visits/year

Pilot Sites - Progress to Date

- Clinical Focus Immuno-oncology Management
- Key stakeholders have been engaged/signed off
- Billing opportunities being finalized and expanded to other work already in place via the in-house specialty pharmacy
- Collaborative Practice Agreement being drafted
- Anticipated impact approximately 260 420 new patients/annually
 - Pre-treatment education
 - Follow-up calls planned post each infusion
 - Possible program to include 4000 billable visits/year

- Clinical Focus Oral Anticancer Agent (OAA) Therapy
- 2 sites are merging working through logistics
- Drafting Collaborative Practice Agreement
- Working with practices regarding billing opportunities
- Ongoing discussion with Karmanos Specialty Pharmacy and how best to optimize/integrate clinical patient support
